MINUTES OF BUSINESS MEETING - BANGKOK CRC 2016

(Minuted by Adeeba Mehboob and reviewed by Farooq Mehboob)
October 1st and 2nd 2016
Centara Grand Ladprao

1. CALL TO ORDER / OPENING REMARKS – Faroog Mehboob

The 15th RAL CRC was called to order at 2:00 pm on October 1st, 2016 by Farooq Mehboob (FM), DRC for RAL, acting as Chair. He welcomed all the Members and Regional officers, and thanked them all for their presence and continuous support of RAL.

2. & 3. INTRODUCTION OF ATTENDEES AND VISTORS AND ATTENDEES - AII

FM introduced himself and thereafter requested all those present including Delegates, Alternates, Officials and Dignitaries to introduce themselves.

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4. REVIEW OF AGENDA – Faroog Mehboob

The Agenda was unanimously accepted without changes or amendments.

5. INTRODUCTION OF TOP SPONSOR FOR CRC – Zeki Poyraz

Farooq acknowledged the Platinum sponsor of the CRC in Bangkok, Mr. Zeki Poyraz on behalf of ISIB, turkey. He expressed his gratititude to them for enabling the hosting of a very successful RAL CRC in Bangkok.

6. APPOINTMENT OF PARLIAMENTARIAN – Samir Traboulsi

Farooq invited to appoint Samir Traboulsi as the Parliamentarian for the CRC 2016, whom he cited as being a proven successful parliamentraian over the years. Farooq appreciated his continuous and valuable services to RAL since its inception. Samir was pleased to accept the appointment.

7. INTRODUCTION OF RECORDING SECRETARY – Adeeba Mehboob

Farooq invited Adeeba Mehboob to be the Recording Secretary for the meeting which Adeeba gladly accepted.

8. APPROVAL OF MINUTES - CRC 2015 ISTANBUL

Farooq requested a motion for approval of the minutes of the RAL CRC 2015 in Istanbul.

The motion was moved by Sajid Abbas and seconded by Mahmoud Fouad.

Motion was approved unanimously.

9. ADDRESS FROM GENERAL CHAIR – Pankaj Dharkar

Farooq gave special thanks to the CRC Committee for having worked tirelessly over 18 months to make the Joint CRC with Region 13 in Bangkok a success. He then requested Pankaj Dharkar, The General Chair of the CRC 2016 to say a few words. Pankaj expressed his and the CRC Committee's great pleasure in welcoming all the guests and the ASHRAE Board of Directors to Bangkok. He expressed his deepest thanks to the CRC Committee for their immense efforts in enabling a successful CRC and hoped everyone would enjoy themselves during the course of the conference.

10. ADDRESS FROM SOCIETY PRESIDENT – Tim Wentz

President Tim Wentz addressed the delegates present defining them to be the 'Future of ASHRAE'. He elaborated on the theme of his presidency, wherein he believes that ASHRAE should adapt and drive towards becoming more global. In this, he sees RAL as the beacon in the movement towards a more global pesepctive, in what ASHRAE as a society can be and what it can do for the world. Tim sincerely thanked everyone in the Region for their continued and invaluable support.

Farooq thanked Tim for his kind words of support and expressed how much everyone in RAL value Tim's leadership.

11. ADDRESS FROM SOCIETY VICE-PRESIDENT – Walid Chakroun

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Farooq introduced Vice Presdient Walid Chakorun as one of the pioneers of RAL and as a dedicated ASHRAE Member who has helped every region. He added RAL was proud to have him as part of the Society Excom. Walid thanked Farooq and said he appreciated RAL and the great work they do.

He proceeded to give the Society VP Report which he said was essentially 'Great news'. The report shows RAL has had the largest gain with 2 new chapters and 13 new student branches.

The 'Connect a Colleague', new initiative, designed to invite potential ASHRAE members, has resulted in 100 new members.

Walid said that it is important that ASHRAE Volunteers have their employer's support and the ASHRAE's 'Thank Employer' portfolio should be be taken back by every Chapter President.

The RP funds raised had a 2% increase, however Walid noted that RAL and R13 can do much more to see this amount increase. He requested for RP Chairs to campaign in these regions.

The report showed Scholarships worth \$152,000 provided to students and 32 Society scholarships and 11 Chapters awarded. He also encouraged the idea of the RAL Chapter Scholarship.

Walid spoke about ASHRAE's Strategic Plan which has a 5 year globalization plan, but said it needed the help and input of every member to achieve this goal and make the plan actionable.

He highlighted the Flammable Refrigeration Research where ASHRAE has a \$5.7 million initiative. He acknowledged the support of Bassam Elasaad, with money contributions from AHRI. Walid spoked about the ASHRAE and UNEP collaboration which started in Sub Region A but later became more involved with Society and where they are working very closely with Society now, helping ASHRAE becoming more global. Several Refrgeration courses have and are being developed by stakeholders and practitioners. He announced that a course on Refrgeration practices was being held in Bangkok. Anyne wishing to contribute was requested to please contact him.

Walid urged the support of Chapters to help getting the ASHRAE's Building Rating System, the BEQ applied.

He informed everyone that the consolidation between IAQA and ASHRAE alllowed for discounted members between the two organizations. He added that IAQA and ASHRAE Chapters were encouraged to hold joint meetings and that the IAQA Staff now based in Atlanta worked very closely with ASHRAE Staff in Atlanta. The merger aims to benefit members with new publications and standards.

Walid also pressed upon the need to encourage ASHRAE members in obtaining Certification in the 6 programs that ASHRAE are currently offering and noted that there were very few members certified from RAL. He requested RAL members to get the certification and informed them that the exam time was extended for non English speaking mmebers.

Walid informed about the Portal for the AHRAE handbooks wherein a member can share certain files and work with them. He also reported that ASHRAE had 2 new HVAC courses, level 1 and 2 which were quite successful thus far.

Regarding GGAC, he stated that a lot more could be done by the committees especially in having ASHRAE Standards implemented. He hoped for more collaboartions outside North America.

He appreciated the great effort of ASHRAE and RAL to hold a successful Joint Conference and the first International Board meeting outside the United States.

Finally he invited all those present to spare a moment and think about what ASHRAE being global meant to them, and hand in their responses at the end of meeting. This he added would be passed on to the Planning Meeting enabling them to gain a better understanding of the members' visions of a Global ASHRAE.

Farooq thanked Walid for the very detailed and informative report.

Bassam Elasaad requested to speak a few words. Representing AHRI, he thanked everyone for succesful CRC. He highlighted that AHRI and ASHRAE were in close collaboration and wished to reinforce that, adding that he had attended the Beirut conference from AHRI. His message was that there is yet a lot of room for development on the regulations side, especially in RAL and Sub Region A where there is a need for all chapters to get adapted to the ASHRAE Standards. He cited the Kuwait 90.1 and 90.2 ASHRAE Standards as a great success and hoped more chapters and regions would follow suit.

12. RAL EVENTS AND CONFERENCE ANNOUNCEMENTS – Chapters

Farooq permitted all the chapters who wished to announce their Events and Conferences to take the floor. He requested that all this information be sent to Adeeba Mehboob, RAL Webmaster, who was **ACTIONED** to include the announcements into the RAL Website and newsletter, including YEA Events and Leadership Program announcements as specifically requested by lonna Deligkiozi.

Farooq further requested all RAL members for as much participation in the Regional Events and Conferences in order to strengthen the relationships and technical resources of the region.

The host chapters invited everyone to attend their particular events.

Hasan Sultan announced the

 "Second International Conference on Energy and Indoor Environment for Hot Climates"

February 26 - 27, 2017 Doha, Qatar

He said there were 48 abstracts and a couple of keynote speakers. He added that this was the biggest ASHRAE conference outside the United States. Furthermore, there is ASHRAE training on the 28th,1st and 2nd of March, 2017.

He announced that the Qatar Oryx Chapter would recognize and provde incentive to the region by awarding the two chapters in RAL with the highest attendees with incentive and awards. He stressed that this event was Important for the climate and would enable ASHRAE to set standards for the hot climate areas.

Farooq requested Hasan to send the flyer to Adeeba to put it up on the website. Hasan informed everyone of the ASHRAE Oryx mobile app that would also have this information and allow registration through it.

Dimitris Charalambopoulus announced and invited everyone to the dual conference

He said that this was a new International conference on Enivorment and Energy. He spoke about the conference on Green Transportation that the Hellenic Chapter successfully organized in collaboration with the Hellenic navy, this year in June, with the attendance of then President David Underwood. He highlighted that this was a new industry and could expand scope of society. The conference had 50 paper submissions and 15 keynote speakers and workshops.

He added that the Hellenic Chapter would try to webcast the seminar, but would definitely upload it on the Hellenic Chapter Website and possibly the RAL site too.

The Indian Chapter announced the

The Pune chapter announced their 7th Annual Conference.

Akaash Patel announced the 10th Annual Conference in Ahmedabad this year for Health care in the hospital sector expecting to have between 250-300 paticipants.

Abbas Sajid announced and requested all to attend The ASHRAE Bangladesh Chapters first Conference.

13. PRESENTATION REPORT FROM ASHRAE HEADQUARTERS – Steve Comstock

Faroog requested Steve Comstock to share his report with the Delegates present.

Headquarter
Report
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ASHRAE

Steve presented his report on the Statistics and Information from ASHRAE Headquarters. He impressed upon the fact that all publications were from volunteers who contributed 8000 pages that are annually published. The ASHRAE business was therefore to nurture the volunteers.

The ASHRAE library has over a million users with 200,000 titles and access to alliance titles.

He also requested Chapters to reserve ASHRAE Training offered by ALI for their chapters.

Steve spoke about the ASHRAE E-learning centre and the improvements to the education portal that have been made.

He reminded and reassured the members that ASHRAE Staff were always available to help.

14. ADHOC CHAIRS REPORTS

ADHOC SUB REGION A REPORT

Farooq requested Richard Rooley to present his report of the Adhoc Committee for Sub Region A.

Richard gave an overview of the background for the need and work of the Adhoc Committee. He reminded that in 2013-2014, there was great concern in the Region At Large which was becoming an extremely large region. This was causing difficulty in the processes and management of RAL. There was a perceived imbalance of representation among Sub Regions causing significant concern. A Strategic plan report for the region was developed to see how RAL could go forward with this. Richard was the chair of the RAL Strategic Planning Adhoc committee. As part of that committee the Chapters were surveyed with questions that were also generated from Chapter and grassroot member feedback. The responses were eletcronically received and a report formulated and shared with the Region during the last CRC. There was an unanimous conclusion for balance of elected representation of the 3 Sub Regions and strengthen them by appointing Sub Region Vice Chairs known as Assistant Regional Vice Chairs, ARVCs. The

management was thought to be strengthen by 15 ARVCs. Instead of one Business meeting of the Region during the CRC, each Sub region would meet separately and streamline the information being tabled at the ain Regional Business Meeting.

Richard thereafter proceeded to explain his current Adhocs report whose objective is to look at the region of Africa in Sub Region A and its relationship to the rest of the Middle East. He pointed out that Africa has problems. North Africa, which he described as above the Sahara is looked after by Egypt, by the Cairo chapter, which is a very strong ASHRAE Chapter and has a dominant HVACR society. It has good relationships with the the neighbouring countries' societies and it is growing strongly. ASHRAE has to ensure however that it continues to grow along with its realtionship to ASHRAE Nigeria which has over 100 members. The original charter had responsitibilty for West Africa, but due to some turmoil with the government of Nigera, it is developing more strongly with its kindred societies. There is a great interest in the area and the adhoc is reviewing their arangement which must ensure that they are looked after very carefully. It will Itake a little longer to establish them as they are weak but are growing.

South Africa have 100 ASHRAE members divided into the East coast of Johannesburg and the West coast. South Africa has a very strong associate society SAIRAC, who look after training in South Africa and arrange regular meetings. There was an attempt 3-4 yrs ago to see if an ASHRAE chapter could be formed but that didn't happen. It may take some time to push for a Chapter but understanding how to develop a better relationship with SAIRAC can develop SAIRAC tip satisfactorily.

The Relationship this region has with other sub regions is still work in progress. Richard expects that over the next year a clearer picture will develop of how the Sub Region A, the Middle East and Africa relates.

Samir Traboulsi questioned what the rationale was for wanting to remove Africa from Sub Region A. Richard answered that this question had been put forward to Africa who wish to stay with them. However, South Africa was not sure yet. Richard clarified that there was still no proposal to separate Africa but there was reason to look at it vey carefully since there are many countries spread over a large continent, but that they could still move forward. Elkader queried what the position of East Africa was. Richard replied that Egypt looks down on East Africa and the committee was looking for evidence. Dr. Maged Fouad asked what the possibility of having East Africa under Egypt was. Richard clarified that it was inextricably small since they did not have any associate societies even though there are societies there. He assured that the committee was gathering information and would have more statistics by Januray. Faroog commented that Dr. Mageds point was relevant. The Cairo Chapter he said can look at the development and cater to the need of members in East Africa. Sub Region A members can opt to be a member of that chapter if they so choose. He requested to develop a plan of action. Dr. Mahmoud further added that the fact that the Construction industry is dominated by Egypt can be utilized in order to increase membership and start Sections. This he felt would most likely come out from research. Richard said he was aware of how powerful Egypt is in Africa, and that many memebrs in RAL, even if they don't live there they are members of that Chapter. He said the committee was talking to Egypt and Nigeria to see how the small populations around it could be catered. He noted that this was a very fertile area to look at.

Richard requested Adeeba Mehboob to put the RAL Strategic Plan report on the RAL website soon.

David Underwood was given the floor to provide an update on the work of his Adhoc Committee. He first clarified the Committee's interpretation of their objective which he defined as trying to find a means to better serve the European members which may over time become a separate region.

David informed everyone that the committee had their first meeting by conference call on the 1st Sept 1, 2016. The committee is using 4 documents for the basis of their work that are the Adhoc Report on Grassroots and National Associations, the RAL Strategic Report, the MCI Report and the Developing Economies Report. He added that it was necessary to develop a questionnaire for circulation to every induvial member in Sub Region B since most are Non Chapter members. This would enable them to understand the path to undertake. The committee intends to send these out by the 14th October and review the results on the 11th November 2016 offering a clearer picture and report by the Las Vegas Meeting.

David thanked everyone for their efforts thus far.

ADHOC OPERATING GUIDELINE AND IMPACT OF ADHOCS ON RAL

Ron Jarnagin admitted that the work of this committee was running behind schedule. Ron stated that the Indian chapter qualifed to becoming a region even though there has been no discussion on this yet. Should that happen RAL will have remaining chapters which could be challenged. Ron reiterated that the work of this committee was to focus how RAL would be impacted should any one of the Sub Regions pull away from the Region and the potential areas of concern because of it.

He urged everyone to come forward in meetings like the Sub Regional Meetings and voice their opinions and concerns, pointing out the pitfalls and benefits of structural changes in the Region. He added that the decision would have a lot of pluses and minuses but that it was crucial to pay attention to every Sub Region and their impact on each other. He acknowedged that the Sub Regions possibly did not have the infrastructure, internal or external, nor well operating Chapter officers that can lead and manage their offices. However, he thinks that it is not necessary for all chapters to have that. He said the committee would focus on the subject. He feels that the New ARVCs can form a second line of officers and suggested that they be tracked for their knowledge in order to nurture them into potential new leaders. His opinion was that a 3 year ARVC cycle would allow for this evaluation and growth to take place.

He then invited questions and comments. Pankaj Dharkar corrected Ron on his statement that India could qualify to becoming a Region which he said was only possible with Pakistan, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka together. Pankaj stated that 3 years was a good amount of time after which a better decision could be made.

Hasan Sultan first thanked the Adhoc Chairs for their work. He then asked them if they could provide a hint on the philosophy of the questionnaires. He requested for the process to be in two stages, with the first questionnaire submitted for review and comments before the second and final questionnaire was drafted. Farooq Mehboob thanked Hasan for raising this question. He pointed out that this same process was adopted by the Strategic plan Committees earlier and requested that the Adhoc chairs do the same. David Underwood agreed and thought this a legitimate and valid comment but highlighted that this was also dependant on the number of people involved. He said this was discussed at the Sub Regional B Meeting also. He pointed out that The Strategic Planning Report was based on feedback from a Chapter level however sending out the questionnaire twice to every member, especially the large number of Non Chapter Members in SRB, would require a much longer timeline. Two or three questionnaire from SRA and SRC. Timeline much longer. Richard Rooley reiterated that the underlying issues are

those that are already in the Strategic Planning report so Chapters were already aware of these issues and could send anything futher to committees for consideration in the developent and application of the new report and the three questionnaires that will go out from the committees.

Dr. Samir Traboulsi said there was no doubt on the leaderships of the Adhocs, but suggested that the three committees should come together and meet each other and sit in each others meetings so that everyone could move forward together. He reiterated that those present and in the committees are all working on behalf of RAL and together it should control its own destiny.

Ashish Rakheja added that he was at the SRB and SRC Adhoc Meetings where it was clear that SRB is looking at Europe and the possibilty of coming out with a Region. He added that political alignments had to be looked at but assured that all 3 Sub Regions would put forward 1 consolidated report. He also felt that a 3 year cycle was important in order for a new and healthy leadership to be realised. He reiterated that the Adhocs needed to see the process in a more holistic manner and on intructions from Farooq are trying to do that with an Interim Report ready for the Las Vegas Meeting 2017.

Farhan Mehboob shared his observations working on the committee, reassuring all that though each of the 3 Sub Regions are different, they are all working to the same goal and are going forward together.

Richard added that the three Chairs did have a separate meeting wherein it was amply clear that they all shared a dominant common intent on how they can serve the ASHRAE members better. He said they all had the experience in asking the appropriate questions to achieve this purpose.

Farooq expressed how deeply grateful he was to the three Presidential members whose wisdom he felt were undoubtedly one of the greatest assets ASHRAE and RAL are priviledged to have.

15. REGIONAL REPORTS – Sub Regional Chairs

15.1 SUB-REGION A REPORT – Nohad Boudani on behalf of Khalid Al Mulhim

Khalid was unable to attend the CRC due to visa restrictions but had nominated Nohad Boudani to present his report on the actvities and MBO's of Sub Region A.

The biggest highlight of Sub Region A was the re establishment of the Bahrain Chapter after it had been dormant for over 5 years. Furthermore, the Bahrain Chapter has gathered a strength of 30 students and are looking to form a student branch soon.

It was revealed that serious efforts were underway in creating a Jordanian chapter which has a current membership strength of 21. A parallel track of efforts are being sought to ensure that if a chapter cannot be formed a section be established under the sponsorship of the Lebanese chapter.

Other notable achievements were, the hosting of Presdient Tim Wentz by the Falcon Chapter, Saudi Arabia Membership promotion at its MEP Exhibition, the 6th International Conference on Energy Research and Development organized by the Kuwait Chapter and the 2nd International Conference on Efficient Building Design: Material and HVAC Equipment Technology in Lebanon.

SR B Report

Mr. Mulhim plans to work closely with Dr. Alaa on establishing a Section or Chpater in Alexandria, Egypt. He aims to enocurage the Oman Section in becoming a Chapter and is hopeful that a new Iraq Chapter be formed.

15.2 SUB-REGION B REPORT – Ken Goodman

Ken Goodman presented his report on the activities and MBO's of Sub Region B.

He was disappointed to report that the Benelux Section had been dissolved but was happy to report that the Ireland and UK Section had a better success story to share, both of which are looking to be transitioned into Chapters in the next year. Ken was also assisting them in the formation of student branches.

The Ireland Section inaugurated its first board and the members were showing keen interest in organizing several activities which include hosting President Tim Wentz, holding a joint CIBSE ASHRAE event and planning an Annual Event. Similarly the UK Midlands Chapter saw several events successfully organized by the Section as well as many collaborative events held with its many partners. The new President Edward Murphy plans to conitnue this drive, with events planned for President Tim Went's visit and more.

Both sections have Members keen in pursuing ASHRAE Training and Certification.

Ken is assisting in establishing a Chapter in Cyprus.

He has formed an Adhoc to improve member engagement and hopes to address the outcomes of the Adhoc in the upcoming year.

He has facilitated the collaboration between YEA and CIBSE YEN.

Ken has further organized monthly meetings between the Institute of Refrigeration and the UK Section and aims to increase participation in these meetings.

Also on his agenda is the development of an initiative to online stream Technical Events.

15.3 SUB-REGION C REPORT – Mohammad Abbas Sajid

Abbas Sajid presented his report on activities and MBO's for Sub Region C.

Important achievements of this Sub Region were the formation and chartering of the Bangladesh Chapter and the establishment of 9 student branches, which is 45% of the total 20 new student branches in the entire Region. He credited Mr. Ather Siddiqui for his tremendous efforts in achieving this many student branches.

Sajid gave an overview and account of his activities as Sub Region Chair C in the past year. This included attending the inauguration of the Bangladesh Chapter, visiting of 5 out of 12 chapters in the Sub region, attending various conference in the Sub Region as well as Society Summer and Winter Meetings. He intends to visit more chapters and conferences and strengthen the cooperation between the ASHRAE Chapters in the Subregion and AASA, the ASHRAE Associate Society Alliances.

16. RVC REPORTS (2015) - RVCs

16.1 RVC CTTC - Mohammad Tassi

Tassi presented his report on the activities and MBO's of the CTTC committee.

He gave an overview of the DL visits made in the past year noting that 52.9% of these visits were multi Chapter visits and which he urged should be increased to 75%. He noted that there was one Non Utilized Visit.

Tassi urged Chapters to utilize the remaining 14 Allocated DL Visits that are available for the year 2016-2017. He highlighted the need to try and have DL Allocations such as to maximize the number of Chapters visited within this DL Allocation.

He went over his objectives as CTTC RVC which notably included

- Initiating an Adhoc Committee for the ASHAE Technical Awards for which RAL has two entries. The adhoc would assess RAL potentials, shortlist the proposed candidates and assist them in filling applications.
- Promoting Regional Programs and Events through a separate committee
- Support RAL Conferences with 3- 5 DL's per year

Tassi looked forward to the assistance of the ARVC's in achieving these goals and objectives.

Lastly he pointed out one of the challenges for a newly appointed RVC was that they were not efficient till after three months of their appointment since they are unaware of their expectations and duties till they receive training at the CRC. He requested for some solution to this.

16.2 RVC MEMBERSHIP PROMOTION - Naseer Ahmed

Naseer presented his report on the RAL Membership Numbers. He was proud to report that the current RAL Membership was 4941 members, an increase of 3.44% from last year and exceeding the goal of 2% set during the CRC last year. The Deccan Chapter was the lead contributor to membership seeing a growth of 132.5%, followed by the India, Falcon, Qatar Oryx, Sri Lanka and Chennai Chapters. A big round of applause was given to these chapters.

The concern that Naseer put forward though was the Delinquency. He urged the members to take immediate action to reduce these numbers and requested the Chapter Boards and Society Officers to address this issue too. He suggested a few ways to tackle the problem that include the Chapter MP Chair being actively supported with the assistance of two or three members, more frequent Regional and Society Officer visits to Chapters, more events, lectures and DLs organized at Chapter Level. He also said the MP Chairs were looking at possible ways to attract and involve young engineers through YEA and the SmartStart Program.

16.3 RVC STUDENT ACTIVITIES – Michel Hayek

Michel Hayek presented his report on RAL Student Activities, reporting a current number of 1858 Students in 105 RAL Student Branches, with an increase of 20 new branches. Noteworthy were, the highest Student Members in the Pakistan Chapter with 339 Students in 7 branches, and the highest number of Student branches in a Chapter, the North Pakistan Chapter with 16 branches, 12 of which are active. These achievements were marked with a huge round of applause.

Also of significance was the news of the 3rd place winner of the Design Competition by Gazi University in Turkey and the winners of the Student Grants.

Michel next pointed out that of the 105 Student Branches, only 50 were active Branches, proposing that if a student branch does not submit a report in 2 yrs then it should be declared inactive and consequently, dissolved. He requested all Student Activities chairs to try and get some of these branches more active. He stated one of his objectives is to start student chapter branches where there are currently none.

He also highlighted the fact that RAL Student branches were not taking opportunity of the scholarship funds which they should be encouraged to try for and avail.

16.4 RVC GGAC - Maged Fouad

Maged Fouad presented his report on the activities of the GGAC Committee.

He went over the responsibilities and objectives of the GGAC.

He highlighted the need for Chapters and sections to develop relationships with local chapters of other organizations through joint meetings and networking events and seek opportunities for collaboration. He stressed the need to further engage with policymakers and promote the adoption of ASHRAE Standards and Guidelines into code.

He urged all GGAC Chairs and Chapter Presidents to activate a clear action plan and to sustain all current MOUs, agreements and deals initiated by previous GGACs.

Maged plans to schedule 2-4 visits to chapters in the region before the winter meeting. He aims to regularly monitor the progress of chapters, supporting the active chapters in targetting Society Public Policy Priorities and encouraging and directing the passive chapters to do so eventually.

16.5 RVC RESEARCH PROMOTION – Dr. Mahmoud Fouad

Dr. Mahmoud Foaud presented his report on the activities of the RP Committee.

Barring an estimable contribution from a few chapters and Sub Region B, he regretted to inform that the RP Contributions from RAL in 2015-2016, as a whole, were meagre, falling short by almost half of the RP goal.

In order to recitfy this situation he suggested that Chapters be encouraged to distribute their contributions on a monthly basis with the final three months of the year left for contributions aimed to achieving higher than 120% of the goals. He encouraged Chapter contributions higher than 120% as they would make up for any chapters with lower contributions.

He clarified that the monthly contributions could be done online.

Mahmoud suggested introducing a Regional Awards for Chapters that will follow the suggested

RP Contribution Payment pattern and finish their RP involvement early.

He aims to find means to extend support to the Chapters with low RP contributions and hopes that the new RP ARVC's will successfully assist in increasing RP Collections.

Bassel Anbari queried whether Chapters were achieving Full Circle. Dr. Mahmoud replied in the affirmative.

Hassan Sultan commented that the Qatar Oryx Chapter had reduced its RP Contribution because of an economic slow down and a need for reinvestment in better Chapter Performance. He said what may be viewed as a Chapter slow down was in fact a build up of Chapter potential.

17. RAL OFFICERS REPORTS (2016)

17.1 REGIONAL COORDINATOR YEA CHAIR – Ioanna Deligkiozi

Ioanna Deligkiozi presented her report on YEA and their Activities for 2014-2015.

She first went over the organization structure of YEA, recapping the mission of YEA and the responsibilties of the YEA Chapter Chairs.

She was happy to report that YEA had seen a 6% increase in membership to 928 current members, and even though this was short of the 15% that was targetted for, the remaining results of last years objectives more than compensated for this shortfall. 524 YEA members are currently participating in TC's, i.e an increase of 41%, there are 140 YCC Chairs, 21 more than the targetted 119, and the SmartStart Program saw an increase of 20%.

Ioanna went over the upcoming years MBO's which include nominations for the YLI, LeaDRship U and LeaDrs Program. It is also intended to increase the participation of YCCs in the CRCs. She then gave an overview of her work as YRC, and the notable work done by the YCCs as well as the experience of the RAL YEAs at the Conferences.

She requested Chapters to consider contributing their RP Funds to YEA, eligible also as a full circle contribution.

Finally loanna gave some recommendations to Chapters that included foremost the assigning of YEA members into YCC positions and encouraging their close working with SA and MP Chairs. She also stressed the importance of YEA members attending the YLI to strengthen the leadersip of the future ASHRAE.

17.2 REGIONAL RECC WEBMASTER – Adeeba Mehboob

Adeeba Mehboob began by thanking everyone for their very kind acknowledgement and appreciation of the compilation and editing of the 'History of RAL' book. She thanked Farooq Mehboob for his vision to create this project and credited Tim Dwyer for his great efforts over the many years in gathering documents and photographs, charting the history of every Chapter in the Region, and which proved to be a great resource in the making of this book. She also recognized the Chapter members who helped provide the information included in the book. She did however note that given the short time frame available to publish this book due at the CRC 2016, some errors and mistakes were inevitable, and in this regard she requested that members of the Chapters bring necessary corrections to her attention to enable her to have these implemented for a future edition and more importantly for a revised version be made availale online on the RAL website.

Webmaster Report Attachment M Page 1 of 10 Adeeba recapped the recommendation of the RAL Adhoc Strategic Planning Report 2015 to have a quarterly newsletter in RAL to enable better communication within the Region. This was actioned and a Newsletter Committee set up compirising her, the three sub Regional Chairs and the YRC, following which the first Newsletter was published in June 2016 and the second in September 2016. She did however note that a committee of the Chapter Presidents may be more fruitful and efficient. She then urged all chapters to come forward and regularly send her or their Chapter Presidents any news, information and announcements they would like to have included in the RAL Newsletter and Website enabling the timely publishing of a beneficial Newlsetter and a regularly updated website.

She then apprised the Delegates of the status of the RAL App, the idea for which was initiated during the CRC last year but which was actioned to her when she took over as ECC Chair at the end of the Society Year 2015-2016. She gave an overview of the possible features of the app and showed two options of the look and functionality of the app. The major challenge is the Membership Data being sought from Society, who citing security and privacy concerns are unwilling to provide this information. RAL however have clarified that they simply require Membership aunthetication and are attempting to find a solution to this.

Adeeba said she would also look into the possibilty of having a Basecamp 3 set up for RAL.

17.3 REFRIGERATION – Branislav Todorovic

Prof. Dr. Branislav Todorovic presented his report on RAL Refrigeration Activities.

He provided an update on the various conferences and events that were held in the region and that covered refrigeration topics in their seminars as well as heat pumps, renewable energy sources topics. He mentioned a few notable speakers from ASHRAE, IIR (International Institute of Refrigeration) and UNEP that have graced these events with their presence and contribution.

He revealed that the Refrigeration & Energy Efficiency Committee of the Serbian HVAC Society, is conducting a regional e-Learning *Star Refrigeration's* e-Learning program on the phase-out of ozone layer depleting and global warming gases (HCFCs and HFCs) in cooperation with the LINEP

Lastly he announced the upcoming Annual Refrigeration conference in Greece that will be on Refrigeration in mobile units. The conference was on Refrigeration in Ships the previous year.

17.4 NOMINATING COMMITTEE - Irene Reichert

Farooq then requested Irene to present her report as Nominating Committee Delegate and thanked her for her invaluable work that has supported RAL for so many years.

Irene reported the tough schedule that she and Bassel Anbari had nominating the 15 new ARVC positions that the ASHRAE BOD had approved at the ST. Louis Summer Meeting following the recommendation of the RAL Strategic Planning Adhoc Committee. They had less than two months in which to draw up the eligibility criteria that was made after several communications and inputs from Chapter Presidents. The final recommendation by the DRC was done by the end of August in time for the ARVCs to be able to attend the CRC 2016 in Bangkok. She thanked everyone who enabled this process to be achieved.

Irene was also happy to report that the training time for Delegates and Alternates had been increased before the caucus and requested all of them to be well prepared for the upcoming nominations.

17.5 REGIONAL TREASURER - Nivedita Jadhav

Nivedita Jadhav presented her report on the financials of RAL for the year 2015-2016.

She first began by giving special acknowledgment to Tracy, Annemarie and Craig for assisting the CRC Committee with the registration and payment process.

The motion to accept the RAL Accounts Report for the Year 2015-2016, was proposed by Dr. Mahmoud Fouad and was seconded by Saleh Zein. The motion was approved unanimously. The Closing Statement revealed that RAL was close to meeting its expense and income targets closing with a \$ 6000 suplus at the the end of the Society Year, short by \$1000 of its goal.

She then put up a table of Current Chapter Dues and requested that all Chapters pay their dues as soon as possible, preferably during the CRC.

Nivedita then revealed the Budget for the New Society Year 2016-2017 which projects a surplus of \$1000 at the end of the year. This is because greater expenses are envisaged in terms of developing the website and app and more officers travels in response to improve communication between Officers and Chapters.

She hopes to better the accounting system in the upcoming year and urged that the Chapter Opportunity Fund be properly utilized.

17.6 REGIONAL HISTORIAN - Tim Dwyer

Tim Dwyer was absolutely delighted to present his Historian's report for the Region.

He listed the Chapters that had achieved the minimum PAOE points, 5 chapters, and the 11 that had reached PAR.

He updated everyone on the interviews he had conducted and recorded of the Past DRCs and which are available on the testsecure.co.uk website for viewing. He continues to add historic biographic information of all the DRCs. Simlutaneously, the website continues to be updated for more images and documents relating to CRCs and chapter foundations. It is intended to have this website linked to the RAL Website too. He was pleased to add that almost 50% of the Chapters had active Historical Pages.

Tim proceeded to give a quick run down of his previous years objectives and their completion and success status. Of note was the fact that he has been able to establish working links with 19 of the 25 Chapters. More importantly though was the successful enabling of 8 chapters to progress for the requirements of the Gold Ribbon Award at the last CRC. He has attempted in vain, but continues his efforts, in qualifying Chapters for the Lou Flagg Award. He also endeavors to having a RAL Historical Project published in an ASHRAE publication.

Nohad gave a quick rundown and summary of his RMCR report for 2015-2016 as follows

It was noted that except Chennai, there were no entries for any Chapter for the CTTC Awards. Mohammad Tassi clarified that Krishnan, ARVC CTTC, was looking into encouraging Chapters for qualifying for Chapter CTTC Award and Chapters were requested to assist in the same.

Farooq said he would send Chapters the guideline for the Presidents New Initiative, the Chapter Opportunity Fund'. He promised that any surplus from this CRC would be added to the fund.

Other items noted during the review of the Chapter Summary Report were as follows:

- The Hellenic Chapter reported its balance for the Year 2015-2016 was \$ 53,000.
- Farooq appreciated the work of the Lebanese Chapter and the excellent arrangements for President Tim Wentz's visit.
- Bangalore was appreciated for its great work in carrying out a significant number of Chapter Events, Seminars and Technical Programs.
- Ather Siddiqui from the Northern Pakistan Chapter was given special recognition for his great contribution in establishing the highest number of student branches.
- Hassan Sultan was applauded for keeping the Qatar Oryx Chapter energized.
- The Danube Chapter was recognized for operating successfully despite covering so many countries spread apart.

Farooq requested that Chapters review the Spreadsheet, which was actioned to Adeeba to be put up on the website, and make a comparison of their performance with other Chapters so that they may recognize the areas where they can improve and succeed.

Saleh El Zein requested clarification on the term Chapter Events in the Spreadsheet and whether it covered the chapters' technical events, social events or both? Farooq responded by saying that most chapters had reported their technical meetings but some may have included their board meetings too. This will require a clarification for the next CRC.

Pankaj Dharkar queried if anyone had had any contact with Nigeria and requested that RAL Officers to travel there as they were an otherwise active and successful Chapter. Richard Rooley confirmed that Dr. Essam was planning of attending a Conference in Nigeria and Richard himself was intending to do a DL visit there.

20. PRESENTATION REPORT ON CRC 2016 - Ashok Virmani

Ashok Virmani presented his report on the CRC 2017.

He announced that offers for hosting the CRC 2017 were received from the Danube Chapter in Belgrade, Egypt Chapter in Sharm El Sheikh, from the Lebanese Chapter in Beirut, Lebanon and from the Turkish Chapter in Antalya, Turkey.

The Turkish Chapter had offered to host the CRC 2017 in Antalya for between 11-15% less cost than that in Bangkok but Ashok put forward the question of whether RAL could hold it economically cheaper than that. It was also suggested that consideration be given to having Lebanon jointly hold the CRC with Turkey in Antalya. Farooq Mehboob requested the nominees to each make a cost estimate for the Cost to members for the CRC 2017 and revert back by the 15th October, 2016 to help narrow down the final destination for the CRC 2017.

Mohammad Tassi queried if Dubai, which had been put forward at the Planning Meeting by the Falcon Chapter was not being considered any longer? Farooq replied that they were still in the running and should make the cost proposal too. Saleh El Zein voiced that the Lebanese chapter would be very pleased to be the host of CRC 2017 and agreed to submit a cost proposal as early as possible.

Michel Hayek sought for feedback from Society concerning Beirut as a destination and whether there was any reservation regarding it. Jeff Littleton affirmed that there was currently no problem from society with Beirut as a CRC Destination.

Farooq requested the women in RAL to start and set objectives for the Women in ASHRAE RAL group. Nivedita Jadhav accepted to start this initiative.



Recommendations







Final Remarks (I)

- Chapters are encouraged to distribute their contributions on a monthly bases according the suggested pattern, with the final three months of the year left for contributions higher than 120% of the goals.
- Monthly contributions can be done online
- Contributions higher than 120% are highly encouraged to make up for other chapters (Even higher PAOE points are suggested).
- In this way monthly revisions of achievements can be reviewed (more frequently).
- Following this pattern may have a great impact on the PAOE points for the chapters

Final Remarks (II)

- I suggest adding regional awards for chapters that will follow this suggested pattern and finish their RP involvement early.
- Support can be extended to the Chapters with low RP contributions, to find ways for enhancing their achievements.
- To solve the problems of lake of contributions from some sub-regions, new RP ARVCs may embark on the encouragements of the RP collections from their sub-regions

Region-At-Large (Sub Region B) – Motion 8 (11/5/2015):

That ASHRAE review CTTC PAOE points to amend the following: Hold planning session and finalize program schedule prior to October 1 within 3 weeks of CRC workshop training 2 weeks after the CRC or before October 1 whichever is later.

This amended motion was approved and will be part of the 2016-17 PAOE categories. (Complete)

<u>Sub Region C – Motion 12 (11/5/2015):</u>

That ASHRAE consider setting up investigate creating a technical award category for projects engineered within Developing Economy countries.

Status: The amended motion was referred to the Chapter Technology Transfer Committee (CTTC). CTTC agrees with the premise of the motion but has assigned an ad hoc to further investigate the possibility of a new award category for developing economies as part of the Technology Awards. (Open)

<u>Sub Region C – Motion 13p (11/5/2015):</u>

That ASHRAE should consider having at least one international member (outside of North America) on its technical awards judging panel.

Answer: This motion was referred to Chapter Technology Transfer Committee for consideration. CTTC was in favor of this motion. The CTTC Technology Awards Ad Hoc was in the process of revising the Technology Award Judging Panel selection process to ensure that one member from outside of North America sits on the panel each year and these changes were approved during the Orlando meeting. (Complete)

Northern Pakistan Chapter – Motion 13a (11/5/2015):

That the Student SmartStart Program fees be reduced for developing economies to the old structure i.e.

1st year \$20, second year \$20 and third year \$40.

Status: This motion was referred to the Finance Committee since they are already addressing this issue. The Finance Committee was not in favor of the motion. The figures in the motion are close to the figures that Finance recently approved. (Complete)

<u>Lebanese Chapter – Motion 20 (11/6/2015):</u>

That society offers technical courses with certificate of completion during the CRC similar to those offered at the society meetings.

Answer: This motion failed. The information is already available using the ALI courses. (Complete)



<u>Lebanese Chapter – Motion 21 (11/6/2015):</u>

That society provides free registration for one delegate from each chapter to participate in the society winter meeting.

Answer: This motion failed. Delegates do not have official business or meeting functions to attend the Society conferences. The fiscal impact would be cost prohibitive to reimburse transportation to all ASHRAE chapter delegates. (Complete)

<u>Lebanese Chapter – Motion 28 (11/6/2015):</u>

That society decides the CAP on transportation reimbursement to CRC two weeks 30 days before the CRC and to be based on a 14 day advanced ticket price at the most feasible economical direct flight rather than the cheapest flight.

Answer: The amended motion was approved. (Complete)



<u>Lebanese Chapter – Motion 29k (11/6/2015):</u>

That society reimburse CRC transportation expenses for MP Chairs and RP Chairs who didn't attend the MP / RP centralized training.

Answer: This motion was referred to the Membership Promotion Committee, RP Committee and the Effect of Centralized Training on CRCs ad hoc committee. (Complete)

- RPC response: The RP Committee was not in favor of this motion. This motion is already
 in effect. Centralized Training for RAL RP Chapter Chairs currently takes place at the
 RAL CRC and the Chapter Chairs transportation is paid.
- MPC response: The MP Committee was not in favor of this motion. The committee has agreed to only reimburse for attendance at Centralized Training. This policy is included in the Manual for Chapter Operations.
- PEC's Functional Planning Subcommittee assigned a small working group in response to the "Effective ASHRAE Materials Delivery To and Through Chapters" report developed by Mr. Austin and has tasked the group to work on a response to this referral. The ad hoc committee gave a detailed report during the St. Louis meeting and other groups have been assigned to implement. The detailed report serves as an attachment to this and similar motions that were submitted during the regions fall CRCs.



<u>Lebanese Chapter – Motion 34e (11/6/2015):</u>

That society sets a deadline for answering society motions submitted during Fall CRC, say end of May of the following year.

Answer: This motion failed. This is already the common practice. The 2014 fall CRC motions were updated and published online by May 28, 2015. (Complete)

<u>India Chapter – Motion 39 (11/6/2015):</u>

That all ASHRAE events held in a country or a geographical area covered by a Chapter to be done in association with the local chapter, and sales of ASHRAE publications during this event to be handled by the local chapter.

Answer: This motion failed. ASHRAE should not have to change a process that has worked successfully for the Society over the years. (Complete)

CRC - Bangkok 2016



Lebanese Chapter – Motion 40 (11/6/2015):

That society reimburse transportation expenses for one delegate from each chapter to participate in the society winter meeting.

Answer: This motion failed. The delegates would not have a purpose at the Society meetings. Currently, the LeaDRS shadow their DRC and transportation is charged to the DRCs' allocated chapter visits. The fiscal impact would be cost prohibitive because if reimbursing transportation for all delegates from one region, Society would have to reimburse transportation for all delegates from all regions. (Complete)



Northern Pakistan Chapter – Motion 41 (11/6/2015):

That Chapter Historian be Reimbursed for Travel Transportation to attend the CRC.

Answer: This motion failed. This issue should be handled at the chapter or regional level since thehistorians are not a grassroots committee. Currently only chapter delegates, alternates and the grassroots committee chairs are reimbursed for training to attend the CRC or for RP and MP Centralized Training (see excerpt below from the MCO). **(Complete)**

Excerpt from the reimbursement policy:

D. For positions not listed as authorized approval to attend the CRC, the DRC may invite other region or chapter positions to the CRC, however, transportation costs will not be reimbursed for these optional members except as defined in Section I, Paragraph B.

The chapter visits will be used as a way of transportation reimbursement only if authorized by the DRC to attend.

Sub Regions A. B and C – Motion 42 (11/6/2015):

That society reimburse transportation expenses for Region At Large Sub Regional Chairs (SRCs) & ARC to attend the RAL planning meeting during ASHRAE annual meeting.

Answer: This motion failed. The regions are reimbursed for one regional planning meeting. During the 2012 Fall Members Council Meeting, the council approved a motion for the Sub Region Chairs to attend the winter conference at the discretion of the DRC. Also, the average airfare is closer to \$1500 instead of \$1000 as shown in the sub regions' fiscal impact. (Complete)

MINUTES FROM SUB-REGION A MEETING DATED FRIDAY 30TH SEPTEMBER, 2016

1. CALL TO ORDER / OPENING REMARKS – Nohad Boudani

The meeting started at 7:00 am as planned. Nohad Boudani explained that Mr. Khalid Mulhim the SRC-A was not able to attend due to visa problem and hence Nohad was assigned to chair the meeting instead.

Nohad Boudani presented to the audience the report prepared by Khalid Mulhim.

2. ROLL CALL:

Attendance Attachment B

More than 20 attendees were present at the beginning and the number increased to be around 30 around the end of the meeting.

3. CHAPTER UPDATES:

The Lebanese Chapter, Falcon Chapter & Qatar Oryx chapter briefed the audience about their respective Chapter's activities and the Chapters' achievements during the past Society year.

4. ADHOC COMMITTEE FOR SUB REGION A REPORT:

Mr. Richard Rooley presented his report as the Chair of the Ad Hoc committee for Sub-Region A and highlighted the following points:

- Europe is a problem: Small number of Chapters but large number of members associated with local organizations.
- Problem in Africa: 3 areas of populations, north of Sahara where Egypt has the strongest presence in ASHRAE with research, training and meetings; South Africa is at the bottom of Africa with as many members as Egypt but scattered in the east and west with about 1500 km between the two. They have a strong associate society, run research, do training, and an Associate Society of ASHRAE. ASHRAE tried to form a section or chapter here but there seemed to be no enthusiasm for that.

The Associate organization suggests a strong relationship and from ASHRAE's experience where there is a strong local Association and if ASHRAE tries to expand without telling them they will be unhappy with ASHRAE walking in and them having to probably leave. Due consideration required in deciding to do nothing, form a Chapter in competition or build a better relation with them. It may be considered to do what ASHRAE did in Italy, UK and Ireland, where there are also big Associate societies, where a group of ASHRAE members meet the Associate Societies' members 3 time a year.

- Richard gave his thoughts concerning Nigeria which is located on the west coast of Africa, and was formed to be the Chapter of West Africa.
 - They have 180 members, are a strong group that meet regularly but have not grown a great deal.
 - There are also other Societies in Nigeria.
 - ASHRAE does not not understand the political relationship between government and other Societies which is complex. Nigeria has seen an emergence from very corrupt practices in organizations and governments, but getting much better.

Richard said that these issues raised questions which required consideration during the Adhocs study. He reminded all of the fact that the other 2 Sub Regions are also looking at the Regional structure.

He recapped the fact that the RAL Strategic Planning report Report was prepared after a thorough investigation right across the region. The report had revealed that only one European Chapter asked for Europe as a separate region and 4 others proposed they link Europe to Middle East. However Richard noted that these 5 chapters are relatively weak compared to their local Associate societies and it had to be given thought of whether they would be stronger if linked to them or not.

Also required for investigation is to establish if Africa is better off in Sub-Region A; or with South Africa being partly more comfortable with English and having close ties with Europe will be better off and happier being linked to them? Nigeria's place and fit within Sub Region A also needs to be looked at.

As for the Middle East going in with Europe to form a region, attention has to be turned to what would happen to the Indian subcontinent, since if that happened Pakistan would move to Middle East, and this is not simple as one must consider the language and culture.

The model of a Europe only stand alone region with very few, weak chapters, would raise the question of whether it would be viable?

And finally if Europe, Middle East & Pakistan merged into one Region, it had to be thought of how the Indian subcontinent (India) would react.

The comments and discussion that ensued are as follows:

Dennis Knight:

Felt that the group does not need to reinvent the wheel and instead be prepared for a discussion and hear the results from the bottom up discussions in Bangkok.

Shelia Hayter:

Gave thought to one scenario where RAL split into two regions, India and everything else. The only change then would be that India become a separate region and everything else remained in the region.

Fadi Abou Jamra:

Queried what, aside from the cultural differences of the geograhical areas, are the technical needs and capabilities of the other areas and what about the standards?

Richard replied that even in the US, each state sets codes based on ASHRAE standards some over 10 years old; it is very difficult to go to a country like Egypt and say you must write ASHRAE standards into your codes, we would not do that if Egypt looks at CE, DIN, ISO, etc. Data centers - ASHRAE way ahead, if you look at indoor air quality, it is all different - roughly the same.

Richard Rooley:

Added that he went round the table in the last CRC meeting in Turkey trying to get a consensus of if the Region should stay as RAL as it is? He asked what the disadvantages were and if it was mainly that it was enormous?

He then revealed that America have flat lined and are not growing whereas the Middle East South Africa, South America are all growing. But looking at RP, Regions in America give thousands of dollars, contrasting with RAL whose contributions are in the hundreds of dollars. This is because the wealth is very different.

It is necessary to examine solutions on how do we deal with such a large RAL and if the Sub Region model should be used as it is now? A large RAL has issues where for example the motions from all 25 chapters takes upto 2 hours of listening to mostly same motions worded slightly different. Sub-regions can instead discuss local needs and capabilities.

Sheila Havter:

Responded to Richard's observations saying that it sounded like the recommendation is that RAL stay as is. She wondered if the committee had considered the model in Ireland and how it works closely with Associate organizations. Her question was, if the issue of whether RAL should subdivide originated from the feeling that the Region is not serving its members enough because it is too big; and that perhaps there could be another model other than a Region, with a different terminology, having a different structure, that could address how to serve the members better. The advantage right now of the Region model ensures that the administration of services is consistent, but she acknowledged that maybe a Sub Region needs more training, advocacy, etc.; and so rather than business as usual, her advice was to look at how RAL could be structured to meet the members needs rather than address the Subdivision directly.

Richard Rooley:

reiterated what the history indicates, that is ASHRAE is not serving its members correctly. He then proceeded to ask the attendees if they felt that ASHRAE were serving the members correctly.

Egypt:

responded in the affirmative saying that they were trying and actively working on it whereupon Richard asked if they had the machinery to do that. Egypt said they should develop this structure to make it more better.

Fadi Abou Jamra, from the Qatar Chapter:

expressed concern that the approach being adopted was going through regions by cultural rather than technical needs and feels Chapters should overcome their culture differences and make an effort to coalesce. Richard replied that though this may not apply to Middle east, India and Pakistan do not work together and it would require have to get the presidents of both countries to allow it.

Richard Rooley:

said he would repeating what ASHRAE says in public in that ASHRAE would never say the two could not work together.

He said he was in the process of asking each chapter if they felt they were working well within the sub-region framework and adequately serving their members.

Comments from the audience:

People from the audience expressed that they felt much better served by Society than RAL, but the adding of Assistant Regional Vice Chairs would help and adding grassroots chairs in sub-regions is helping.

Richard commented that this structure had only been alive for a few months.

Sheila Hayter:

Was skepitcal that asking members if they felt they were being served well was not the right question. ASHRAE set up a long time ago, when it was much harder to talk to each other, and therefore perhaps the question would be better framed asking what should the region be doing to serve the members well?

Richard Rooley:

Said that the answers for each question would be included in the report. The questions would encompass the 'Need for change', whether members believe chapters being are being served right; the issue of Non-Chapter Members, especially in Europe; what would be the advantage be to a different organization and the reaction to Pakistan and Europe coming nto this sub-region.

India has about 700+/- members. Pakistan +/- 300 members not including students.

Nohad Boudani:

Nohad's opinion was that students should not be counted due to the frequent variation in their numbers.

He suggested that RAL should look at the difference between the North American model and the rest of the world. The U.S. population is around 350,000,000 people with 40,000 members, and similarly RAL should look at its chapter members vs population, India (around a billion), Pakistan (hundreds of millions), sub-region A also significant, but most of these areas use English Language for their standards — whereas in Europe for example, each country uses it is own language to write standards and codes.

Larry M:

Added that it was an old school thought that in Regions, members were close and could meet together, making it difficult in sub-regions of RAL since they were very spread out; he said that instead it was important to look at how to serve members and not talk about chapters and regions; suggesting further that the word 'regions' be replaced with another lexicon. Richard commented that some would say there are x numbers of chapters, x number of members, therefore a region can be formed but that it is important to start from first principles looking at ASHRAE and what can it do for its members. He added that he did look at this issue in a big study, analyzing by numbers, by culture, by languages and on how to vote, how to structure, etc. and concluded that there are changes needed.

Fadi Abou Jamra:

Commented that ASHRAE is not going to create world peace. He cited an example of when IEEE won a court case that the exchange of information should not be restricted as it is needed to advance humanity in general and we should be able to engage better technically to recognize our humanity. Now there is a technical and scientific dialogue between countries.

Nohad Boudani

Ended the discussion havig exceeded the allowed and allocated time and acknowledging that there was a lot to discuss but there was a need to focus on the imminent issues.

Meeting adjourned at 9:00 am



INSTRUCTIONS TO DELEGATE & ALTERNATE FOR CRC

Chapters Regional Committee Meeting

There are four parts to the Chapters Regional Committee Meeting held in conjunction with the Chapters Regional Conference (CRC): the Orientation Session, the Caucus, the Business Session and the Executive Session. As a delegate or alternate, you will be involved in all four of these sessions.

Orientation Session

Open to all attendees, this session is held prior to the Caucus so that the Director and Regional chair can instruct the delegates and alternates on procedures and to advise them as to the regional and Society positions to be filled. During this session other non-caucus attendees can provide advice and counsel as specifically requested by a delegate or alternate. The attendance of delegates and alternates is mandatory.

Caucus (Closed Session)

This is an informal session. It is usually held at the beginning of the Chapters Regional Conference attended by only the delegates and alternates from the chapters, the regional Nominating Committee Member, the regional Nominating Committee Alternate and the regional Nominating Committee reserve alternate. The purpose is to provide a forum for the chapters to present and discuss their recommendations for candidates for regional and Society positions, Society committees, and regional and Society honors and awards. All discussions at the Nominating Committee meetings, caucus and executive sessions are confidential and shall not be divulged to any individual outside the meetings or sessions. The regional Nominating Committee Member chairs the session and the host chapter delegate is the secretary. Minutes of the Caucus are not to be published. During the Caucus, the delegates and alternates should present the biographies of the candidates who will be recommended for offices and/or honors and awards. Enough copies of the biographies should be available so that each person attending may have a copy. The two Nominating Committee representatives shall not be present while their nominations are being discussed. The host delegate shall become the temporary chair. Please note: the ASHRAE Bylaws specify that a member of the Nominating Committee must be a full member in good standing for a period of at least five (5) years prior to the time of selection.

Business Session

Each chapter shall, as a minimum, prepare the following in one complete package, whether a binder, CD or other form, as directed for that CRC:

- 1. A completely filled-out Summary Report Form (Attachment W).
- 2. Report of Chapter Activities for the preceding year, including committee reports.
- 3. Chapter Committee Chairs' MBOs.
- 4. A sample newsletter.
- 5. The Chapter's roster.

After the report phase of the Business Session, the Chapters are encouraged to present action items for changes in any Chapter, Regional or Society activities or policies.

All reports and action items presented at the Chapters Regional Conference will take place at the Business Session, except for those items specified for the Executive Session.

The chapter delegate is the voting member. The regional vice chairs, the regional Nominating Committee Member and the regional Nominating Committee Alternate attend in their official capacity. The Regional Chair is chair of the meeting. The chapter delegates report on the progress of their chapters and student branches and their recommendations concerning policy, procedures and operations of Society. Motions that are passed are then brought forward to Members Council for further consideration.

GUIDELINE FOR CONDUCTING CHAPTERS REGIONAL CONFERENCES

Executive Session (Closed Session)

Only the delegates and alternates from the chapters, the regional Nominating Committee Member and the regional Nominating Committee Alternate may attend the Executive Session. The regional Nominating Committee Member is the chair. The reserve alternate for the Nominating Committee Member is allowed to attend the executive session of the CRC without reimbursement for transportation. The host chapter delegate is the secretary. Minutes of the Executive Session shall not be published. Chapter delegates vote for candidates for the following:

- 1. Nominating Committee Member, Alternate and Reserve Alternate
- 2. Regional Vice Chairs
- 3. Regional Awards
- 4. Society Officers and Board of Directors (including Regional Chair, if appropriate)

The regional Nominating Committee representative will forward the report of the Executive Session to Society Executive Director/Secretary at Headquarters within 30 days of the meeting. Members who serve on Grassroots committees (Regional Vice Chairs) should be contacted as their willingness to serve before their names are submitted in this report.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS AT THE CRC

Chapter members have the right and the responsibility to present to the chapter CRC Action Committee motions to enhance regional, chapter or Society activity. These motions will be presented by the delegate during the business session at the CRC where they can be discussed and voted on, following Robert's Rules of Order. Motions and resolutions coming out of the CRC can be most effective if presented in proper form. A fine conceptual resolution can be lost in the legislative process at Society level for want of proper wording, background explanation or research. The purpose of this document is to furnish suggestions for proper development of motions and procedures to funnel the motion into the correct committees.

All CRC motions <u>except regional motions</u> are brought to the Members Council by the RMCR for action. Members Council will approve, disapprove, postpone, amend or refer these motions in accordance with the following:

- A. Committees and Councils to which Members Council refers a motion must report the disposition of the motion to Members Council.
- B. CRC motions affecting the Presidential Award of Excellence will be reviewed and discussed by the Members Council and recommendations forwarded to the President-Elect.
- C. The RMCR has the responsibility of monitoring all CRC motions from his/her region and reporting at the next CRC the status of those motions.

MOTION FORMAT: The motion should be written in concise, succinct language ("whereas" and "legalese" do not enhance the understandability or acceptability of motions). A sample format is shown on the next page. The body of the motion should contain as completely as possible the following information:

- A. State completely the action which is being recommended or required. Example: "Move that Society dues be lowered..."
- B. Qualify wherever possible elements of the motion so that they are not open-ended or open for interpretation, debate or floor negotiation. Example: "Move that Society dues be lowered to \$90 per year..."
- C. Include wherever appropriate the time frame for the execution of your request. Example: "Move that Society dues be lowered to \$90 per year, effective July 1, 2013" (with background data on fiscal impact, if possible).
- D. Where a motion is expected to modify or to become a Rule of the Board (ROB), it should be worded as the proposed Rule of the Board it is intended to read.

REQUIRED BACKGROUND INFORMATION: As a separate statement, provide historical background, progression of events, related incidents or other general information which would be helpful for the council and subsequently Board of Directors to appropriately debate and decide on the issue. The more thorough the background, the more convincing the arguments, the more complete the research, the more beneficial the request is to the betterment of the Society, the more likely the matter will be dealt with favorably.

In summary, a good motion spells out who, what, when, how much and then explains why it is good and timely action.

JOHN F. JAMES INTERNATIONAL AWARD

Guidelines for the award shall be as follows:

- A. The purpose of the award is to recognize members of the Society who have done the most to enhance the Society's international presence or posture. This award shall only be awarded once to a member. (08-06-23-11)
- B. The award shall be in the form of a plaque, lapel pin, and transportation, if not otherwise reimbursed by the Society. The award may be presented at the Winter Meeting of the Society. (05-06-27-41)
- C. A list of candidates shall be submitted to the Members Council Planning Subcommittee for approval by the committee, who shall then nominate a candidate to the ASHRAE Honors and Awards Committee no later than the preceding Annual Meeting, together with documentation supporting their recommendation detailing the nominees accomplishments that enhanced the Society International presence as described in paragraph D below. (This includes promotion of ASHRAE through relations with Associate Societies and HVAC&R related societies in other countries.) (02-01-13-14-28/05-06-27-41)
- D. The selection of the candidate shall be based upon any one or a combination of the following:
 - (1) Participation in International activities related to ASHRAE's interest.
 - (2) Exchange of information with international communities in the form of symposia, seminars, lectures, etc. (05-06-27-41)
 - (3) Dissemination of ASHRAE technical information for the enhancement of international standards.
 - (4) Adaptation or introduction of innovative HVAC&R technology(ies) between two or more countries. (05-06-27-41)
 - (5) Recruitment of members, and/or the formation of chapters, sections and student branches outside North America. (05-06-27-41)
 - (6) Previous recipients are not eligible to receive this award more than once.
- E. Nominations may come directly from a member or from a CRC nomination. Nominations with support documentation should be sent to Members Council through the Regional Conferences or directly to the Director of Member Services no later than May 1. (05-06-27-41)
- F. The Honors and Awards Committee shall forward the name of the approved candidate to the Members Council for final approval.

Scopes & Activities

Certification Committee is responsible for developing, implementing, and monitoring ASHRAE's personnel credentialing programs.

Chapter Technology Transfer Committee (CTTC) provides efficient and effective transfer of current and relevant information throughout the HVAC&R industry to and from the chapters. CTTC develops and maintains high quality and readily available tools to enable chapters to offer information and attractive industry-related information and programs to all segments within the HVAC&R industry. This committee reports to Members Council.

Chapters Regional Committees exist in each of the Society's regions. Each regional committee consists of one delegate and one alternate from each chapter with the regional chairman presiding. Each regional committee reviews recommendations from the chapters and student branches concerning policies, procedures and operation. Motions that are passed are reported to Members Council.

Conferences and Expositions Committee (CEC) provides ASHRAE members and other meeting attendees with fully coordinated, cost effective, theme-based meetings experiences with balanced technical and business/professional content. The committee also oversees the production of the Winter and Annual Meetings and other ASHRAE conferences and expositions globally. This committee reports to Members Council.

Electronic Communications Committee (ECC) identifies the electronic communication needs of the membership and staff, recommends and maintains policies, and ensures that the implementation of information technologies meets the objectives and needs of the Society. Beginning in July 2004, the ECC assumes the responsibility for the ASHRAE website and electronic communications that had previously been assigned to the Special Publications Committee.

The "Roadmap for the ASHRAE Web Site" represents ASHRAE's vision for development of electronic communications in the Society. The ECC maintains the Roadmap as well as the "Policy and Procedures for Format, Activity, and Content of Web Sites for ASHRAE Groups."

Environmental Health Committee coordinates ASHRAE activities in the areas of environmental health and indoor air quality. This committee reports to Technology Council.

Executive Committee includes the President, President-Elect, Treasurer, Vice-Presidents, the Secretary (who is a non-voting member) and other members of the Board of Directors who may be designated by the Board. The Executive Committee investigates and makes reports and recommendations to the Board of Directors regarding matters relating to the Society or individual members.

Finance Committee supervises the Society's fiscal operations in accordance with the Bylaws and the policies set forth by the Board of Directors. This committee reports to the Board of Directors.

Grassroots Government Advocacy Committee (GGAC) is responsible for grassroots activities and issues that relate to government entities beyond the scope of the U.S. federal government (i.e., U.S. state and local; provincial; and, relative to non-North American nations, national government bodies) in areas of interest to ASHRAE members in order to better coordinate efforts and understanding between ASHRAE grassroots members and local government. This committee reports to Members Council.

Handbook Committee prepares and publishes an ASHRAE Handbook volume each year. It also formulates editorial policy, solicits reviewers and authors, and judges the suitability of material for publication in the ASHRAE Handbook series. This committee reports to Publishing and Education Council.

Historical Committee sponsors, encourages and conducts research into the history of heating, ventilation, air conditioning and refrigeration; encourages authorship and publication of historical articles locates, identifies and determines location for display or availability of items of historical significance; and encourages regional and chapter historians to gather historical information and artifacts. This committee reports to Publishing and Education Council.

Honors and Awards Committee (H&A) administers the honors and awards program of the Society under guidelines established by the Board of Directors. This committee reports to Members Council.

Membership Promotion Committee (MP) publicizes the aims, activities, achievements, and scientific and educational purposes of the Society to encourage qualified persons to apply for membership. The committee also monitors the Society's membership demographics and, where appropriate, adjusts or creates programs to ensure that individuals from all demographic backgrounds are being equally attracted to ASHRAE. This committee reports to Members Council.

Nominating Committee selects candidates for elected officers and members of the Board of Directors. This committee reports directly to the ASHRAE membership.

Planning Committee is responsible for the Society's long-range and strategic planning. The committee develops, implements and monitors the long range plan and develops a method to monitor councils' and committees' progress in achieving long-range goals and objectives. This committee reports to the Board of Directors.

President-Elect Advisory Committee advises and assists the President-Elect in coordinating standing committee activities with the Directors-at-Large.

This committee reports to the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors.

Professional Development Committee develops a comprehensive continuing education program to assist members in enhancing and maintaining their knowledge and improving their skills. This committee reports to Publishing and Education Council.

Publications Committee oversees editorial and functional activities for the publication of ASHRAE books, ASHRAE Journal and ASHRAE Insights. The Handbook series falls under the guidance of the Handbook Committee. This committee was formed by the merger of the Journal/Insights and Special Publications Committees. This committee reports to Publishing and Education Council.

Refrigeration Committee encourages the advancement of refrigeration technology and its application. Through its use in refrigeration and air conditioning systems, the refrigeration process has become critical to the health, comfort, and welfare of humanity. The Refrigeration Committee of ASHRAE encourages the advancement of refrigeration technology and its application. This committee reports to Technology Council.

Research Administration Committee conducts and coordinates basic research and technical studies in the HVAC&R fields to benefit the public welfare. This committee reports to Technology Council.

RP Committee plans and implements programs within the Society to generate funds to support ASHRAE research. This committee reports to Members Council.

Society Rules Committee considers all matters requiring development, interpretation and change in Society Bylaws, Rules of the Board, and other Society documents.

Standards Advisory Committee is responsible for monitoring policy aspects of standard and guideline development conducted by the Society. The SAC shall advise the Board of Directors on specific standards-related issues, and provide guidance/counsel to the Standards Committee and Technology Council.

Standards Committee is responsible for the selection, development, revision and preparation of HVAC&R code language documents, standards and guidelines so that they may be considered for adoption by the Board of Directors. In this capacity, the Standards Committee coordinates the work of Standard Project Committees and Guideline Project Committees that are responsible for the technical content of codes, standards and guidelines. The Standards Committee also cooperates with other organizations in the development, preparation and adoption of codes, standards and guidelines in related areas. This committee reports to Technology Council.

Student Activities Committee (SA) develops a comprehensive program for the educational community for the purpose of promoting and encouraging engineering and HVAC&R careers. It administers and promotes student activities at all levels in the educational system. This committee reports to Members Council.

Technical Activities Committee coordinates HVAC&R technical activities, including appointment, development and oversight of technical committees, task groups and technical resource groups. This committee reports to Technology Council.

Young Engineers in ASHRAE (YEA) Committee enhances member benefits for young professional ASHRAE members, 35 years old and younger, by identifying activities and services focused on their needs. This committee reports to Members Council.

Job Description Excerpts for DRC and RMCR

The following are excerpts of the DRC and RMCR positions. This document is not intended to serve as the full description of either position.

Director and Regional Chair (DRC):

Responsibilities

- Serves as a member of Board of Directors.
- Has prime responsibility to represent Society to region.
- Directs operation for region and presents region, chapters and membership viewpoints.

Qualifications/Obligations

- Shall be a member in good standing and shall have been a Member (grade) of Society for five years or more prior to date of election.
- Should have previously served as both Chapter President and Regional Vice Chair.
- Should be able and willing to travel and devote considerable time to Society

Region Members Council Representative (RMCR):

Responsibilities

- Serves as a member of Members Council.
- Responsibility to represent the region in Members Council deliberations.
- Assist Regional Vice Chairs (RVCs) in furthering the aims of the Society through Standing Committees.
- Maintain communications with the chapters and support programs of the Society within the region.
- Fully participate in all Members Council, assigned subcommittee and Ad Hoc Committee meetings.

Qualifications/Obligations

- Shall be a member in good standing and shall have been a Member (grade) of Society for three years or more prior to date of election.
- Should have previously served as both Chapter President and Regional Vice Chair.
- Should be able and willing to travel and devote considerable time to Society.
- May fill in for the DRC at a Board of Directors' meeting in the event the DRC is unable to attend.
- May also serve as the Assistant Regional Chair (ARC) as well as the RMCR.
- Shall coordinate and communicate with the DRC all Members Council activities as they
 relate to the region and its chapters.
