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#### **FOREWORD**

Addendum l adds requirements in the standard for equipment installed inline commercial grease ducts and the stated requirements in agreement with IMC 2021 and NFPA 96 2021.

*Note:* In this addendum, changes to the current standard are indicated in the text by <u>underlining</u> (for additions) and <u>strikethrough</u> (for deletions) unless the instructions specifically mention some other means of indicating the changes.

#### Addendum I to Standard 154-2016

#### 5.5 Other Equipment

- **5.5.1** Thermal recovery units, air pollution control devices, or other devices can be used in the exhaust systems when specifically approved for such use except where prohibited. Refer to Section 514.2 of the *International Mechanical Code*; <sup>10</sup> for prohibited applications.
  - 5.5.1.1 Thermal recovery units and air-pollution control devices shall be listed to UL 8782.
- a. Devices requiring an hourly fire-rated enclosure, if not installed within a traditional site-built shaft enclosure, shall have an approval to UL 2221 or ASTM E2336.
- <u>b.</u> Access door(s) for routine maintenance and cleaning shall be integral or installed adjacent to the device as required by the manufacturer's listing.
- c. Thermal transfer method shall be limited to sensible heat coil or plate type design only.
- d. For solid-fuel cooking, grease/creosote removal devices must be installed upstream of thermal recovery units.

ASHRAE will take the lead with respect to dissemination of environmental information of its primary interest and will seek out and disseminate information from other responsible organizations that is pertinent, as guides to updating Standards and Guidelines.

The effects of the design and selection of equipment and systems will be considered within the scope of the system's intended use and expected misuse. The disposal of hazardous materials, if any, will also be considered.

ASHRAE's primary concern for environmental impact will be at the site where equipment within ASHRAE's scope operates. However, energy source selection and the possible environmental impact due to the energy source and energy transportation will be considered where possible. Recommendations concerning energy source selection should be made by its members.

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As an industry leader in research, standards writing, publishing, certification, and continuing education, ASHRAE and its members are dedicated to promoting a healthy and sustainable built environment for all, through strategic partnerships with organizations in the HVAC&R community and across related industries.

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
